## LAST MONTH'S MEETING

## 23rd August - Our 12th Anniversary Meeting

We should have been celebrating our 10th Anniversary on this date 2 years ago but the world had other ideas in 2020 which caused its postponement. So we decided to celebrate our 12th anniversary this year instead, which happens to coincide with the 40th anniversary of u3a being founded in the UK.

To celebrate we had invited Consensio choir to sing for us, Ashby's Mayor to cut the cake and we had a glass of bubbly (or non-alcoholic option) to raise a toast to our 12 years completed so far.

Proceedings started with Consensio, a dozen singers along with an accompanist and musical director, who are also all members of Gresley Male Voice Choir. One of the singers, Tim Cox, was also compere and he gave us a potted history of GMVC interspersed with the choir singing songs relevant to the period that Tim was talking about. After some 45 mins, the choir took a break whilst drinks were handed round to all the members, and the choir, to allow us to toast 12 years of Ashby u3a.

The mayor of Ashby, Councillor John Deakin, and his wife Karen the Lady Mayoress, were then invited to cut the wonderfully decorated cake made by our very own Val Reed. Whilst we all finished our drinks, the cake was whisked away to be portioned up (along with more cake) ready for us all to eat with tea or coffee later.

Consensio then returned to the stage to continue to sing their way through the history of GMVC gradually coming up to date with songs from the movies and musicals along with more traditional songs and to finish got the whole audience to stand and sing "Land of Hope and Glory" and "Jerusalem". The acoustics of the church helping to make us all sound nearly as good as the choir itself.

After a further encore, and rousing applause, we moved to the back room for tea, coffee and cake served by the committee members.

The 97 members attending all agreed that the choir were excellent and very entertaining, the cake was lovely and everyone had a good time.

## HOW ASHBY U3A BEGAN

When we were preparing to celebrate our 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary 2 years ago, I asked some of our longer serving members how Ashby u3a got up and running, and I received this interesting account from one of the founders, Carole Harriman.

"Back in 2010 I was due to retire in May, but fortunately for me my company decided to make the HR department redundant, and move the operation to Telford. So I was basically paid to retire early. This left me having to try and find new things to do. My boss had told me that her mother was in U3A, and she was never at home, always doing different activities. I had not heard of U3A, so I Googled it, and thought it sounded interesting. I contacted a few people who were in Loughborough U3A, and asked them about the organisation. They told me that their U3A would not be for me, as it was a very large group with mostly academic groups. At that time, I saw a poster on the notice board near the Post Office, stating that U3A wanted to form a group in Ashby, and asking for people to meet up to discuss this.

I went along to the meeting, and only myself and Malcolm Bird turned up. We met the then Trustee for the East Midlands, Liz Wilson, and we talked about how U3As are run, and Malcolm and myself took away posters to put up around the local area. The Trustee had booked Holy Trinity Church for the first meeting in July 2010, and had asked several different U3As to come and talk about their groups.

The day came and we wondered how many people would turn up. I don't really remember how many came, but think it was more like 50. We listened to the talks, and the Trustee explained all about U3A, and asked for volunteers to form a committee. Both Malcolm and I volunteered along with about 6 others.

We had our first committee meeting, and we all took on a position, it was all very basic at the start, but things started to develop and now we have a thriving U3A. We put up lists of potential interest groups at the back of the church with and people signed them if they were interested. If there was enough to form a group, the group was created and a leader volunteered to run it. From the start we had about 10 groups, and it has grown to what we have today.

Our groups tend to be more 'social' than academic, fitting the needs of our members. However, as we developed, a wide variety of groups have been formed.

We soon realised that Holy Trinity was too big for our needs, and we moved to the Congregational Church, our present meeting place. This suited the needs of the U3A better.

I was the second Chairperson. We met once a month for committee meetings, in a member's home. I used to attend the Networking meetings in Leicester which were held quarterly, with another member of the committee. From these meetings, we absorbed information both from the meeting and talking to other Chairmen. During my leadership we started the Meet and Greet and New starters coffee mornings. I was on the committee for 5 years, and really enjoyed how we grew a new U3A from scratch. After 5 years, it was time to let new members run the U3A."

From reading the minutes of the early committee meetings it appears that 9 people came along to the first meeting on 6<sup>th</sup> July 2010 (more came along later) to form the Steering Committee who would run Ashby u3a until the first AGM where committee members would be elected. Various people agreed to take on certain posts. Michael Golightly as Chairman, Malcolm Bird as Treasurer, Carole Harriman as Newsletter Editor & Events Organiser, Margaret Baxendale as Business Sec, Jane Barnett as Membership Sec, Anne Donegan as Group Co-ordinator and Sue Cornell as Speaker Seeker amongst others as yet unidentified.

Over several months they laid down the rules and procedures which we have today. They had to decide on the cost of membership, when and where to hold meetings, to book speakers, agree the formation of interest groups and to set up the constitution.

On 26th July 2011, they held the first AGM, with 35 members attending, at which nominations were made to elect committee members. Michael Golightly and 2 or 3 others from the Steering Committee chose not to stand for election, but 11 members were elected. As is still the case, the Committee decided amongst themselves which roles they would undertake.

Carole Harriman became our first elected Chairperson, Margaret Baxendale was business secretary and Malcolm Bird continued as Treasurer. Jane Barnett, Sue Cornell, Bob Baxendale, John Howlett, Sue Perry, Sandra Fox, Anne Donegan and Tim Salter were the other committee members.

And so Ashby u3a was officially under way.

Whilst we are celebrating the anniversary of our formation, I thought you might like to see the full list of our previous Chairmen and women who were, or still are:

We then discussed the preparation for the DP table at the Open Day presentation in September. We agreed to submit a selection of our photos over the years for assembling into a slide show.


Our next meeting will be on Thursday 1st September, where the final presentation will be agreed.

## <u>History</u>

#### 25<sup>th</sup> Aug - A history of Cornishware by Dr Iain Hambling

The August meeting featured Dr Iain Hambling, who gave a presentation regarding T. & G. Green & Co, a firm of pottery manufacturers based locally at Church Gresley. Mr. Green originated from Boston, Lincolnshire and, after being rejected three times by Miss Mary Tenniel, emigrated to Australia, where he was very successful in business enterprises. This success resulted in Mary having a change of mind; the couple married and, during their honeymoon in Scarborough, a chance meeting led to Mr. Green's involvement in the Church Gresley pottery in 1864. He was extremely successful although, apparently, a somewhat unpleasant character. The pottery employed around 1,000 at it's zenith, surviving at least three fires.

The best known product, Cornishware, was produced from 1923. The name was due to the use of Cornish china clay as the distinctive blue and white bands were difficult to produce satisfactorily using only local clay. Production continued until 2007, by which time the company was no longer independent. Following the closure, a new company was established in Somerset to produce a range of Cornishware products.

The site of the pottery is now largely derelict although four of the distinctive bottle kilns still remain. These are now listed structures but are on the 'at risk' register due to their neglected condition.

lain gave us a comprehensive history of the pottery and it's products with a wide range of examples available for us to see and handle. Some of the rarer examples are worth many hundreds of pounds. A most excellent and informative presentation.

The Group's next meeting on 22nd September is a self-drive visit to the Bosworth Battlefield Visitor Centre for a talk, site visit and tea. The cost is £14 plus car share and anyone not already signed-up should contact Jane Harris by e-mail or phone (01530 838025) to arrange to be included..

#### Family History

#### 10<sup>th</sup> August

Mary used the Worldwide feature in Ancestry to search German records and found what looks like a Parish Register document. Unfortunately, it is both in cursive, and German, so we will need a translator. Work is ongoing to deal with that, if possible.

Richard has managed to access some early 19th century parish records for the marriage of his 3rd great grandfather and may have some WWI information to show.

John H was working with some success on the 1939 Register in order to establish a link to his Irish ancestors in modern times.

Eileen is building up an album of Family History records to present to her sister on her 70th birthday. What a wonderful idea!

Dora is deep into 17th century Scottish Parish Records chasing her 4th great grandfather.

Sylvia Spare reported by email on a very interesting visit she paid to Exeter University Film Library. No results forthcoming, but the hunt goes on. Her grandfather worked in the industry for 30 years and there was a large collection of information lodged with the BFI Archives. This is proving frustratingly difficult to access.

Sylvia Dearing reported interesting developments, with DNA tests being taken by two relatives, which will hopefully lead to discoveries. In addition, she has had contact with someone involved with the descendants of her maternal grandfather which will produce information not only of ancestors but living descendants.

After the meeting Richard, Mary, Eileen, John D and the two Sylvias submitted copy for Open Day, and Carolyn will loan us a Flip chart easel to display a lot of this.
