28th August – Bill Devitt 'What gave rise to the Industrial Revolution'

25 members braved the rain to come and listen to Bill's talk today. He started out by saying that the Industrial Revolution should really be called the Industrial Evolution as it wasn't a sudden change but a more gradual move from an agrarian society to an industrial one and that many factors influenced that change.

During the Napoleonic Wars of 1792 to 1815 a huge number of sequestered horse were killed and so the price of horses and fodder reached an all time high forcing people to look for other means of providing 'horse power' on farms and for transport. The Newcomen engine had been invented in 1712 to pump water out of Cornish tin mines but it wasn't until James Watt's refinements and then Richard Trevithick's high-pressure steam engine of 1804 that a moving engine ran on rails in Merthyr Tydfil. This was a bit of a false start as the price of horses started to fall and the need for an alternative was less urgent. However stationary engines on a cart hauled, ironically, by horses were starting to be transported to farms and other sites to provide horse power all day long without rest.

Mine owners in Northumberland started to realise that engines on rails could provide a quick and relatively easy way to move coal to the docks and so formed the Stockton and Darlington Railway which was the first public railway in the world using steam locomotives when it opened in 1825. Many other railways quickly followed, both in Britain and abroad. Russia was one of the first to buy rails and engines from Britain. Stephenson's Rocket appeared at the Rainhill Trials in 1829 and it introduced many improvements and innovations to steam engines, and trains generally, many of which are basically in use today.

Meanwhile large stationary steam engines started pumping water into, and sewage out of, the emerging industrial towns and cities, whilst others were providing power to the mills and other factories in those towns to drive the machines doing all the milling, weaving, metal stamping and other industries that were springing up.

Transport for all those new products was now a bottle-neck. Roads were unsurfaced, rutted and often impassable in winter for the horse-drawn wagons and stagecoaches of the time. Hard-surfaced turnpikes, i.e. private roads, started to appear but they were little better. It was said that highwaymen could walk alongside the coaches to rob them as they were so slow. Canals were better but still slow. Railways started to get longer and to connect towns and cities together. Transport became faster and the need for communication needed to get faster too. Early ideas included the Pony Express in the USA which could get a letter coast to coast in 10 days by horse, but it only lasted 18 months before going bankrupt when the telegraph superseded it making communication nearly instantaneous.

An interesting look at how the Industrial Revolution came about.

Prior to Bill's talk, Yogi reminded us of the many interesting things that have happened in August over the years, most notably 2 battles (Crecy in 1346 and Bosworth Field in 1485) and the ending of WWII on Aug 15th 1945 with the Japanese surrender.

On September 25th Yogi will be interested in your views on the direction of our History group for 2026. We have tried a 'themed approach this year, tying up Liverpool with Slavery and Revolution, both agricultural and industrial. Has it worked? If so what themes would you like? Where can we go for our day out? Can we link it a theme? Should we have themes lasting longer than one year? When should we place the planning session in the year? Too early and little evidence to judge or too late giving little planning time.

Note also that the October 23rd talk on WWI Shattered illusions by Danny Wells has been postponed. Due to Hall maintenance work being carried out during that week our session cannot take place. So this session will run one week later on the 30th October. Please alter your programme and personal diaries accordingly.

The recorder group met as usual on the first Thursday morning of August. In spite of it being holiday season, there was a good turnout of twelve members.

We started with a selection of pieces from the Red Recorder book, followed by four pieces from the Fourteen Elizabethan Dances. We moved on to Recorder quartets, playing Kalinka, Cherry Tree Rag and Rondeau. Then we tried Maria from West Side story which did not go well. It has complicated rhythm and we soon abandoned it, concluding that it probably needs a conductor to keep things on track. We then tried Beckett Blues and Cameron's Ragtime, neither of which we have really tackled before, but both went well, so we played them twice to make sure it wasn't a fluke the first time.

We then looked at Two Pavanes, both of which were new to the group. Perhaps not the most inspiring pieces we have. We also tried a Chaconne: Ouverture, also new. We played Now is the Month of Maying, which went well, followed by How Merrily We Live to finish, with also went well and is a good arrangement.

Our second session in August, on the third Thursday, was attended by a small but select group of just six. We started by playing the final two pieces from the Elizabethan Dances, then the first two. After an initial problem where we all seemed to be playing at different speeds, it all gradually came together.

We revisited the Chaconne Ouverture, but there weren't quite enough of us to play it convincingly this time, but it has potential.

We did several pieces new to the group, which mostly went well and were enjoyable music. We finished with a few tunes from our Recorder Quartet book and rounded the session off with The Goroum – an all time favourite – which we just had time to play through twice.

20th August

This month we almost had a full house with 8 of us sitting round Annie's kitchen table. To give them something to get their tastebuds around, Mike presented '6 summer wines'. Unfortunately the weather had turned cooler that week so the hope of tasting them on a hot summer evening had passed.

Nonetheless we persevered! Starting with a well-chilled white wine new to all from a district in NW Spain that none of us had heard of. Baron Amarillo Godello 2024 Bierzo. Spain 13.5% from Aldi at £7.99. Godello is the grape. Bierzo is the region near Leon in NW Spain. This proved to be a rather nice dry,

slightly lemony wine being youthful and fresh whilst having complex flavours. That's unusual. Would be nice as an aperitif or with seafood. Despite it being the 1st wine of the night when people are reluctant to score too highly, not knowing what comes next, it averaged 7.8/10 including one 9.



Next up was a rosé highly recommended by Helen McGinn on BBC's Saturday Morning Kitchen, Arc du Soleil 2024 Sable de Camargue Famille Perrin. France 12.5% Tesco £9.50. Unfortunately we weren't impressed. It wasn't overly dry or overly sweet, but it didn't really have much flavour at all. Most disappointed. It only scored 6.2/10.

And so on to the reds starting with a lightly chilled Beaujolais La Burgondie 2023 France. 12.5% alcohol from Tesco at £9.00. This was a very typical Beaujolais with flavours of raspberries, strawberries and redcurrants. Quite light but an intense flavour. Chilling it was good but it would have been better still on a hot day. Never mind, we all liked it and it scored 7.4

Fourth came a Pinot Noir. Errazuriz Estate Reserva 2024 Chile 13% from Tesco £9.50.

This was a much beefier wine which is unexpected for Pinot Noir, which is normally a bit lighter. Quite well oaked despite the label saying it was lightly-oaked. Still plenty of fruit flavour and well-rounded finish. It would be better with food than drunk by itself. Rather nice, it scored 7.9

Fifth was a Tesco Finest Primitivo IGT Terre d'Abruzzo IGT 2023 Italy 13.5% costing £8.50. This is not what some would call a summer wine but it comes from Abruzzo in southern Italy which is a pretty warm part of the world in summer so it should cope with our climate. Despite being inky-black this was actually lighter tasting than the Chilean Pinot Noir as it had less tannin but it still had the flavours of plums and black berries. We reckoned it would go very well with pizzas and tomato-based stews as you might expect but also with burgers and almost anything from the BBQ. It scored exactly the same as the Pinot at 7.9

Lastly came another odd-ball wine. Like the very first, it was Spanish and bought from Aldi.

Tempranillo-Bobal Toro Loco, Utiel-Requena Superior 2023 Spain 12.5% at £5.29. This had won a Gold Medal at the Berlin Wine Trophy 2024 and was quite heavily discounted from about £8. It comes from Requena which is about 40 miles inland from Valencia and is supposed to be ideal for tapas and grilled meats, however it split the room, 2 liked it, 2 very much didn't. It had a slightly odd aftertaste and certainly wasn't as pleasant as the previous reds and it only averaged 7.2. A little disappointing.

Our wine of the night was the white Baron Amarillo Godello from NW Spain. Mainly because it was very pleasant but it was also so unexpected coming from a wine area we'd never heard off. A good find.

We were a little unlucky with the wine-buying as on the very day of our tasting Tesco dropped their prices by 25% for 6 or more wines. Mike bought the wines the day before!

Next month John will be serving up a selection of Rieslings. That should be interesting.
